January saw Cinnamon chefs visit Callebaut Chocolate Academy to develop their chocolatier expertise.

The Chocolate Academy is situated next to the Callebaut Chocolate Factory in Banbury, Oxfordshire. It is run by Julie Sharp, formerly Executive Pastry Chef at Claridges, and UK Academy Chef Mark Tilling, winner of the first edition of Bake-Off Crème de la Crème as well the winner of two editions of UK Chocolate Masters.

The chefs were welcomed with a presentation about how Callebaut chocolate is made, showing the challenges of the small area in which cacao beans can grow, the difficulties involved in transporting them and the production of the chocolate callets or chips used in Cinnamon homes. The presentation highlighted how important it is to use every last drop of chocolate.

The chefs then donned their Chocolate Academy whites and convened in the development kitchen to learn about all the different methods of tempering chocolate and which recipes they could accomplish with the different chocolate products. Each chef received a recipe book that The Chocolate Academy had created for Cinnamon for the day. A demonstration of how to create chocolate meringues, mousses, brownies and Guinness cake followed before Cinnamon's chefs had a go at tempering chocolate themselves and creating their own chocolate lollipops and decorations.

A fabulous lunch followed, during which Julie heard Richard Pearshouse,

Cinnamon's Executive Chef, mention the Cinnamon Easter Egg Challenge. As a result, the afternoon session concentrated on the process of making Easter eggs with different designs using cocoa butter and colours, and it included lots of helpful tips. The chefs thoroughly enjoyed their development day at Callebaut's Chocolate Academy.

The winners




