They decorated a fence leading to the garden with over 40 handpainted, different-sized butterflies and set this against a background of a forget-me-not blue sky to remember those who are no longer with us. At the bottom of the fence are a row of forget-me-nots; these flowers are widely associated with dementia and represent remembrance. The Rivermede Court residents decided to include a gap in the row of forget-me-nots to symbolise the memories lost by dementia.

Candice O'Neill, General Manager, said, 'Hanka Vlhova, our Activities Co-Ordinator, and Sharna Watkins, Care Assistant, led this project but all the creative ideas came from our wonderful residents who thoroughly enjoyed taking part.

'The artwork is stunning. Our residents used butterflies to symbolise three things: the rare





butterfly moments that don't last long but stay with you forever, the different shapes and sizes of butterflies that symbolise the different stages of dementia, and the movement of butterflies which show the ups and downs along the journey of living with dementia. 'Our residents took their artwork one step further by photographing it with shadows of people along the fence. This represents the loved ones in our minds. It is very powerful and we are all so proud of the residents who created it to raise awareness of dementia and its impact.'

activities. They crafted an ocean








