

# Professional development

At Cinnamon Care Collection, we are always pleased to support team members' professional development. This year, the National Activity Providers Association (NAPA) is offering a Level 3 Certificate in Activity Provision in Social Care.

If any Cinnamon activities team member is keen to do this course, please discuss it with your General Manager and then let Geoff Pride, Activities Support, know at geoff. pride@cinnamoncc.com. Cinnamon will pay the fee as part of your professional development.

#### Who is it for?

Aimed at activities co-ordinators, the course develops understanding of the social benefits of providing opportunities for different kinds of activities in the context of care. It

provides a valuable insight to learners of ways in which activity provision can provide meaningful and purposeful engagement for people. It will enable learners to contribute to the planning, delivery and evaluation of an activitybased model of care. Learners will receive unit workbooks, a course handbook, a camera for assessments and full tutor support.

### **Course content**

The course comprises five units:

- Co-ordination of Activity Provision in Social Care
- Equality and Diversity in **Activity Provision**
- Implement Therapeutic Group Activities
- Community Involvement in **Activity Provision**
- Activity Provision in Dementia Care

#### The certificate

To achieve this qualification, the



learner MUST successfully complete all five units. Learners will achieve unit credits and a certificate for each unit they complete. Those completing all five units will receive a fully accredited award certificate from Open College Network (OCN) London and the NAPA Activity Leader certificate and badge.

### NAPA LEVEL 3 NVQ: COURSE REVIEW




